


longer standing. If you have a project of your own, show your plans to other members, and get their advice and ideas.

CHAINSAWS: The right way to start your chainsaw

Article 3 of 11

The first rule for starting a chainsaw is probably the most important.

NEVER "drop-start" a chainsaw. Drop-starting means holding the machine with the left hand on the front handle, the right hand holding the starter cord, then allowing the machine to drop.

This is a recipe for disaster. You have only one hand actually controlling the machine. If you lose your footing, there is nothing to stop you falling on to the moving chain.

The proper procedure is to lay the saw on the ground, make sure there's nothing touching the bar and chain, place one foot through the handle to hold it firmly, bend down to hold the front handle with your left hand, then with the right hand give a straight upward pull on the starter cord.

When pulling the starter cord, take up the slack first then pull it in a firm, smooth action. Don't jerk it.

Before you do this, however, make sure the ignition is turned on, the throttle is set at half lock, and the choke is in the full "on" position for a cold engine start.

The engine should be pulled over until it fires. However, it's not necessary for the engine to run before the choke is opened. If you continue pulling over the engine with the choke on after it has fired, then you will "flood" the carburettor, making it almost impossible to start again immediately.

Because chainsaw engines are made of magnesium alloy, they cool very quickly. If left on for about 10 minutes after running, you must do a cold re-start – choke full on, etc.

NOTE FOR LEFT-HANDERS: Sorry, but chainsaw manufactures don't design special saws for left-handed people. You'll just have to learn to operate the machine in the right-handed way – left hand on the front handle; right hand on the rear handle. This will position you on the correct side of the guide bar so that all safety features work in your favour. Operating the saw the other way round is courting disaster because it puts you right alongside the cutting chain.

Timber flow and Storage

We are still waiting on the electrician to install the new kiln timers. This has held up drying as the fans are being switched on manually, but not every day.

Generally, we have good supplies of the most popular timbers though the best quality camphor laurel seems to have been used up, leaving a large quantity of slabs with less colour in the racks. In the next few weeks, I will be calling for helpers to cut these slabs into usable timber. Ron Donald has been slabbing some big logs of camphor in the yards and these new green slabs are showing excellent colour.

We have a good quantity of dry red bean on hand in the outside racks plus the large amount of dry red cedar which was generously donated to us. George Blowers has delivered some big section pine slabs which will be very useful for cabinet framing. We have a large quantity of Silky Oak and White Cedar in the racks.

I have reorganised the racks of shorts and offcuts in the annex to provide more space and to clean up the area. I have started giving away smaller shorts which have defects and are dark with age and have been rejected in the racks for years.

Remember that the process for buying timber is easy. Just select the piece or pieces you want then ask any of the office bearers (the guys with the extra tags on their badges) to measure and calculate the cost. Pay on the day. Sorry, no IOUs.

As can be judged from the above, lack of timber

choice is no longer an excuse for not producing some of those magnificent creations for which the Blackall Range Woodcrafters have become famous. 'Into it Girls and boys!' We need a good stock to show off at the July Expo.
