

GIVE OUR BANDSAW A BREAK !

Our poor little 1/8" bandsaw cops hell from inexperienced users – are you one of them?

We break 10 times more blades on this unit than on any of the other bandsaws! Largely it's not the fault of the machine – rather the inexperience of the user.

Five causes of blade breakage are: 1. When the blade is blunt you keep pushing harder to make the cut – all this does is shove the blade against the rear guide, heat the blade and snap it. 2. Reversing the workpiece when the blade is still moving – this often pulls the blade from the top guide. Wait until the machine stops before reversing the workpiece. 3. To make a cut the workpiece must be moving forward – twisting the workpiece to go around a corner without forward movement twists the blade and bingo, another break.

4. When cutting a curve the blade must be perpendicular, not bent to the left or right. Have a look at the aluminium plate on the tabletop and see how much has been cut away by moving the blade away from the central position. You'd break too if we bent you that much!


5. The top blade-guide should be no more than a finger thickness above the workpiece – if its much more than this the blade can have too much lateral movement.

How hard is the piece of wood you are cutting and is the saw the right unit to be doing the job? Many members use the 1/8" saw when the larger-bladed saws would do a more efficient cutting job.

We can't afford to keep supplying 1/8" blades at the present rate – either we improve our efficiency of use or members pay for blades they break.

I will be conducting an education session on the proper use of this bandsaw on Saturday, 25th July at 9am.

CHAINSAWS Efficiency at "the business end"

Article 5 of 11

The performance of a chainsaw is, in the end, only as good as the saw chain. A poorly maintained, blunt chain is not only inefficient, it's also unsafe, because it can lead to kick-back.

A chain can become blunt very quickly if it's being used to cut timber covered in sand or dirt, or when the chain has been allowed to touch the ground.

You'll know the chain is blunt if you have to start exerting pressure to make the saw cut, or if you see smoke coming from the guide bar, indicating that the blunt chain is overheating the lubricating oil on the bar. The bar should always be a t a temperature that allows you to touch it comfortably immediately after it has been operating for some time. Another sign of a blunt chin is fine sawdust rather than chips of wood being pulled from the cut.

Saw chain revolves around the bar at more than 15 metres per second, depending on engine type, size, bar length, etc. This means a lot of friction where any two parts rub - rivets or tie straps against drive links, drive links against cutters, and the whole chain against the bar. Without proper lubrication between the friction faces, the parts will rapidly wear out. All chainsaws have lubrication systems by which oil is pumped into the guide bar groove where it is scooped up by passing drive links.

Much has been written about sharpening saw chain, but your best bet is to follow the manufacturer's instructions. Don't wait until the chain is so blunt that it won't cut at all. Do your sharpening as soon as you notice the chain becoming dull. If you leave it until the hard chromium face is worn off then you might as well throw the chain away.

If the saw is "running off" in the cut - that is, cutting to left or right rather than straight ahead - this means the chain is becoming blunt on one side. This can cause wear on the rails of the bar. The rails can be flattened off by draw-filing across them to bring them to an even height. Most wear to a guide bar occurs on the under side. That's why, every time you sharpen the chain, you should also reverse the guide bar, so you get the top and bottom edges wearing evenly. It also means you will get twice the life from your bar.

Don't forget to tension your chain correctly on the bar. It should be just tight enough to move freely when pulled by hand (with gloves on of course!)

If you are in any doubt about your ability to sharpen or maintain either chain or bar, take both to your service dealer. It's well worth the small charge he will make. When it's time to replace either part, do the same.

Timber flow and Storage

On June 13th we loaded the improved trolley with large very colourful green camphor slabs recently cut by Ron Donald. The new trolley design was a great improvement. Entry to the kiln is still a problem however as a running approach with six people pushing is very dangerous with a heavy load and we will have to work out a way to make it easier.

A week later a another stack of camphor slabs was loaded alongside by hand without a trolley and this proved a much less dangerous way to load and unload the kiln.

Our storage racks are full of timber of several popular varieties which is ready to use. This is a good thing at this time of the year as kiln drying slows for the winter.

George Blowers has done a great job cleaning up the yard with his trusty Dingo and the result is a large heap of firewood. Please help yourselves.

Ron Donald has been busy slabbing on fine Saturdays. We have a log of Black Wattle ready for slabbing, which will be welcome as cabinet timber, and a large amount of donated small black wattle logs which are still green. Ray Currie and the Porta Mill Crew have cut some Red Bean into various thicknesses including some thin slabs for the boxmakers. George Blowers and his tree hunters have been busy again this month. Some large logs of colourful camphor laurel have come to their notice in Montville and approaches are being made to secure them for the Guild.

The the main timber racks are becoming mixed again and we must try to keep timber clearly identified for use. Not everybody can identify timber by sight and it is important to stack timber in the right section or if there is no room, to at least use masking tape and a Texta to make its identity clear.


