The Plane Truth about Ray Bryant

Late last year, I noticed that Ray Bryant was sanding the legs of a very elegant cedar hall table. He had moulded these legs from veneer so that they had two sides that were flat and two that were curved. At that point, I had just finished making a wooden plane in a style that has been made popular by James Krenov, a well known American woodworker.

I thought that this plane would offer a nicely burnished flat finish for the straight sides and with less effort than it would take sanding. So, I offered my plane to Ray and after a couple of passes, he was a convert and decided that he wanted to make one of these planes himself.

As a first step, he decided to make a scraper plane to a design that he had been thinking about. Scraper planes don't give as good a finish as more standard planes but have the advantage that they can handle hard timber and curly grains. Ray's initial plane worked well and encouraged him to move onto a Krenov style plane. At my suggestion, Ray went to a timber warehouse in Brisbane to get some Cooktown ironwood for this new plane. Cooktown ironwood is very hard and has a good reputation in Australia for making planes. Unfortunately, the pieces they had available weren't straight-grained which made Ray's task doubly difficult.

I think it was at this point that Ray's abilities as a woodworker came to the fore. Initially, the throat and the mouth of the plane were a little out of square and it seemed that cranky grain on the side was going to split. However, Ray was not deterred. He re-cut the sides and made brass inserts that ensured everything was square and tight. The end result was a plane that takes a nice shaving.

When I came back from a break over Christmas, Ray had a gleam in his eye and a new blade – he was making another plane! We decided to use a block from an old fence post of Murray River Red Gum that George Blowers had found. It was quite hard, straight-grained and didn't have any cracks. Ray and I then talked through the problems he had with the first Krenov-style plane to see how he should go about this new plane.

The photo shows Ray's initial plane and the 'block' is the

progress on the new plane. Ray has invented a way of using a brass rod and sleeves in the side cheeks that looks as though it will ensure that the plane throat & mouth will be square when it is glued up – well done. I also like Ray's approach to

this little project – take your time, think through problems as they arise and creep up on the end result. Iain Green



TIMBER FLOW & STORAGE MARCH 2010

The kiln was emptied on Saturday 28th of February and the racks were reorganised to provide space for the new timber. The load included good straight slabs of Camphor Laurel and Queensland Maple with some smaller slabs of White Cedar plus three big slabs of Bunya Pine.

It was decided not to reload the kiln on that day because the wet weather had caused dangerous conditions for loading and wheeling trolleys in the yard. I was pleased by the way the kiln crew came together for the morning and by their enthusiastic approach to this often heavy and difficult work, thanks fellows!

John Phipps has volunteered to start converting some of the old warped and cracked slabs in the racks to milled useable timber via the breaking down saw. Please give him a hand if you see him working on his own.

Several stacks of recently cut slabs are stored in the yard awaiting the kiln. This is fine in dry weather but it becomes a worry in the wet, even under the protection of sheets of iron and garage roller doors as rain is blown in. I am hoping that the new covered racks planned will achieve adequate protection, but failing that we may have to regulate production of slabs to match the available dry storage.

If you want a piece of timber and you are a bit hesitant to cut a full slab, just remember the club rule – it is quite OK to cut a slab cross grain providing you leave an off-cut at least 1200mm long. The timber is there to be used and there is no point in keeping slabs in the racks because someone might want a full slab one day. Just ask your shed captain on the day if you are not sure. Your Shed Captain will either price the piece for you or will arrange for one of the authorised senior members to do it.

The weather continues to be too wet to bring slabs from the yard to load the kiln. As I would like to have at least some timber in the kiln to show to visitors on Open Day I am hoping that the sky will be clear, and the ground dry enough in the next few days to allow us to do it.

Good quality hardwood including some White Ash remains in the racks. If you are thinking of some cabinet making, why not consider some good Australian hardwood for your project?


