



Hearing Protection

This part 1 of an article by BRWG member lain Green. It first appeared in Issue 66 of the Australian Wood Review

Some years ago, I was completing a pre-employment medical check and the Doctor commented that I had some mid-frequency hearing loss. While I hadn't noticed any hearing problems, I wasn't too surprised, as I have occasionally used power tools without hearing protection over the years. As it tends to develop through small changes, I think that hearing damage can creep up on you. The ultimate prospect of course, is to become profoundly deaf as we get older and the isolation this leads to is not a place anybody wants to go.

Measuring sound levels: The human ear can meet an enormous range of sound intensities. The difference in watts/sq metre between a sound at the threshold of human hearing and a space rocket on takeoff, can be a factor of 10¹⁵. To accommodate this range, a logarithmic scale is used to measure sound intensities and is called decibels or dB for short. On this scale, a 3dB increase corresponds to a doubling in sound intensity and 10dB is a 10 fold increase. Interestingly, the human ear interprets a 10dB increase as a doubling in loudness which is fortunate as this somewhat compresses the apparent sound range. On the decibel scale, a sound intensity approximately at the threshold of human hearing has been set as 0dB. The decibel ratings of some common sounds include:

dB	Activity	
0	Threshold of hearing	
10	rustle of leaves, a quiet whisper

The effect of this logarithmic scale is that a 10dB increase at the bottom of the scale is very small in absolute terms whereas a 10dB increase from 120dB say, implies a very significant increase.

Noise induced hearing loss: Our hearing depends on hair cells in the inner ear that convert sound energy into electrical impulses that travel to the brain. These hair cells cannot grow back if they are damaged. The energy from an intense "impulse" noise can cause immediate and permanent hearing loss. Fortunately, noise from most woodworking machinery is unlikely to be loud enough to cause immediate damage. Prolonged exposure to sounds

of less than 75 decibels is unlikely to lead to hearing loss. However, long or repeated exposure to sounds of 85 decibels or more can cause hearing loss. The longer the exposure above 85 dB and the more it is above 85 dB, the more likely it is that permanent damage will occur. It is thought that continuous exposure to this type of noise can cause molecules to develop in the inner ear which can damage the hair cells.

In assessing any situation, the question is how loud, how close and how long is the exposure. Adjusting any of these can reduce the risk of hearing loss.

Prevention of hearing loss: Noise induced hearing loss is 100% preventable. Firstly, you need to understand the likely range of noise in your workshop. Noise varies a lot between different types of equipment and depends on what you are doing. Here are some indicative noise levels that I've collected from a range of sources to give an idea of what can be expected:

Chisel Mortiser	74dB
Drum Sander	75dB
Dust Collector	82dB
Jointer	88-104dB
Bandsaw	90dB
Compressor	92dB
Belt Sander	90-95dB
Moulder	92dB
Radial Arm Saw	92-100dB
Hand held Belt Sander	101dB
Jigsaw	101dB
Orbital Sander	101dB
Table Saw	84-103dB
Mitre Saw	105dB
Biscuit Jointer	105dB
Router	100-115dB
Circular Saw	118dB
Shop-Vac	123dB
Framing Nailer (pneumatic)	125dB

Noise from woodworking equipment certainly has the potential to cause hearing loss.
