Maintenance Report

21/3 Drum Sander - More problems! The platen electronic control for the motor has developed a fault and burnt out. Also the platen fails to track in the centre of the machine and has destroyed itself. Together with the high usage of replacement sanding belts this machine the most expensive for the club to maintain and may be removed or replaced. Bench Drill - The return spring has broken and will be replaced as a new part is available.

Floor standing Drill Press - New keyless chuck fitted. The return spring on this drill has also broken and will be replaced.

25/3 Belt Sander - New belt fitted.

Small Pen Making Lathe - Tail stock damaged, now repaired.

28/3 Bench Drill & Floor Standing Drill - New return springs fitted.

30/3 Laguna band Saw - A new blade has been fitted to this saw, and again two days later.

Tips and Tricks By Warne Wilson

HOT MELT GLUE: One of the handiest aids around the home workshop.

When you have a small odd shaped piece to shape and sand and no way of clamping it;

Perhaps part of a toy or maybe an infill piece to repair a damaged carving. Try clamping a pedestal stick of wood vertically in a vice then hot glue the piece to be shaped to the top end. You will find this will give you clearance all round to shape and sand. To remove the finished piece try a putty knife to lever it off but be careful not to use too much force and break fibres out. Otherwise you can put it in the freezer because most glues are easy to break when frozen – or try warming the piece with a hair drier. You can always use a heat gun, but keep your distance, don't scorch the wood.

For light turning projects, for example a thin disc which would not create much centrifugal force when turning at speed, screw holes or chuck recess can be avoided by using hot melt glue on a faceplate. To remove the turned item simply remove the faceplate with its completed turning from the lathe and apply

heat to the back of the faceplate.

A spot of hot melt glue on the insertion end of a wire peg board bracket will fix the annoying problem of these brackets falling out every time you take an item from them.

There are many possibilities with hot melt glue – a great point is that this glue will grip straight away – no waiting for it to set. Think of it next time you have a problem where it could be used.

Safety Notes

The most sensitive and valuable of all of our assets are our eyes. They are right in the forefront of our woodworking activities and yet we tend to ignore the danger we expose them to when we fail to protect them. We often say that when something happens with a power tool or machine, it will happen in the fraction of a second before you can blink. Any sort of a catch with a lathe tool or other machine can turn a sharp chip into a projectile. Please wear eye protection!

Machines are inanimate things, they cannot call out when you are hurting them, they do the only thing they can – they can jam, or kick back, or slow down under heavy load. Recently someone winched the drum sander right down into contact with the moving platen with the result that the expensive platen was ruined, and in stalling it overloaded the platen motor causing a burnout and expensive and time consuming replacement. Please remember that our machines are friendly when treated with care and respect, but they can be fearsome when used carelessly.

Dust is a health hazard. Our dust producing machines are fitted with sophisticated ducting. Please check that the 'gate' is open on a machine before you use it. And SHED CAPTAINS! Please switch on the overhead filters at the beginning of your shift.
