The Cooroora Woodworkers Club annual inter-club competition was held on 7th May and a big thanks to Ron Fishwick for coordinating our entries. Thanks also to our judges for helping Ron choose our entries which are shown on page 2. Winning a new battery drill, we came third in the competition on 413 points, Bayside second on 422 and Bribie Island first with 433 points. The standard of work was very high and the new judging system of only taking the best five scores in 6 categories seemed to work. Judging of woodcraft can be quite difficult when the standards are so high as can be attested to by Tony Haigh, Dave Southern and myself when we did the judging for Maryborough Club last weekend.

Last year at Maryborough, Spike Bettega held a workshop on making ukuleles in Maryborough and we had to judge 5 finely crafted instruments in the competition. Perhaps we could hold a similar workshop here?

Maryborough Club is holding their open day on 9th July so if anyone wants a nice day out, it would be well worthwhile the two hour drive.

For those interested, we have the full results and judging sheets from the Cooroora competition available at the shed.

On the subject of competitions, our Club competition is coming up early July so all members should be seriously thinking about putting forward their best work. It is our intention to change the format slightly for our competition this year, perhaps more in line with the protocols used by the Maryborough Club. Competition entries (and only competition entries) will be required to be delivered to the MVA hall on Thursday 30th June for judging. Judging will take place that afternoon by three judges sourced from outside the Club and within the Club. The categories of woodcraft will remain with both novice and open classes. After seeing Cooroora's and Maryborough's work recently, I am looking forward to seeing our best on display.

Unfortunately, I missed the Chainsaw to Fine Furniture expo this year; poor timing to go to New Zealand. Thanks to John Henderson for looking after the show and thanks to all members who worked there in making it again a success in spite of the weather. (Typical of the Range isn't it? Unpredictable weather!).

Since joining the BRWG in 2005, I have noticed the amazing camaraderie that exists within the woodies community. There is always an immediate desire to help one another with ideas, methods, material etc which is contagious and it is what makes this organization a wonderful part of the community. ## Tips and Tricks

#### **HOT MELT GLUE:**

One of the handiest aids around the home workshop.

When you have a small odd shaped piece to shape and sand and no way of clamping it; Perhaps part of a toy or maybe an infill piece to repair a damaged carving. Try clamping a pedestal stick of wood vertically in a vice then hot glue the piece to be shaped to the top end. You will find this will give you clearance all round to shape and sand. To remove the finished piece try a putty knife to lever it off but be careful not to use too much force and break fibres out. Otherwise you can put it in the freezer because most glues are easy to break when frozen – or try warming the piece with a hair drier. You can always use a heat gun, but keep your distance, don't scorch the wood.

For light turning projects, for example a thin disc which would not create much centrifugal force when turning at speed, screw holes or chuck recess can be avoided by using hot melt glue on a faceplate. To remove the turned item simply remove the faceplate with its completed turning from the lathe and apply heat to the back of the faceplate.

A spot of hot melt glue on the insertion end of a wire peg-board bracket will fix the annoying problem of these brackets falling out every time you take an item from them.

There are many possibilities with hot melt glue – a great point is that this glue will grip straight away – no waiting for it to set. Think of it next time you have a problem where it could be used.

Safety Notes

We hate to harp on the subject but we continuously see members failing to use safety gear when using machines and power tools. Ear plugs and dust masks are available and face shields are there for your protection, they should be used. Why not make up a personal tool box with your own ear muffs, mask and safety glasses.

The most common area of neglect is hearing protection. Hearing damage is cumulative and deafness insidiously sneaks up. If you don't want your grandchildren to be told "Grandpa is as deaf as a post" be kind to your hearing.

We encourage new members to have a look at the display of curios on the ledge half way up the stairs. Most of them have resulted from incidents over the years and they are a graphic reminder to maintain a vigilant safety attitude.

We cautioned a member recently who was trimming the end of a short piece of wood freehand on the table saw. Wood being sawn on a circular saw should always be properly supported. The drop saw should be used in such a case; if used correctly it will safely make a clean cross grain cut at right angles.


