Glue squeeze-out.

When gluing pieces of wood together, some glue squeeze-out will usually happen when the clamps are tightened. Obviously squeeze out has to be removed, but ideally in a way which will not leave glue residue that will show when varnish or lacquer is applied. Woodies by their natures are innovative and different ways are preferred according to experience and attitude. Some say "Just scrape it off when it's dry, I'm going to paint it anyway." Others have learned to be fastidious, knowing that the slightest trace will show up later. Most of us are in the middle somewhere and we try to minimise the problem.

Wiping it while still wet with a dry rag will spread it out and make the problem worse. Wiping glue with a wet rag while it is still wet will certainly minimise the problem but it will leave a trace of glue on some woods, particularly the porous ones, which will still show under some finishes.

Taking it off with a sharp chisel when it is mostly dry is often effective but the glue will have penetrated the surface fibres; enough to show, because it will act as a barrier to contrast the slight but desirable colour darkening when the finish is absorbed into the wood. Chiselling it off when dry is a popular way, but this runs the risk of breaking out bits of the surface which will lead to attempts to repair later.

Rub it out with sawdust while wet. This is a good way of getting rid of squeeze out without damaging the wood, the sawdust absorbs the glue and can easily be rubbed away. However glue that has penetrated the surface will still be there and the same problem will show.

Lacquer is very forgiving of this problem, but a plan to use oil, wax, polyurethane, or French Polish is not so forgiving.

What to do?

When we built the carved red cedar doors for the Maleny Community Centre we wiped the squeeze out with wet rags thinking we got it all, but when the wiping dried we could still see the remaining glue film which would show under the polyurethane finish. The carved trees were OK but they had a halo of glue film around them.

I came up with a radical solution but it worked. I took one of the wet rags we had been using which still had a trace of glue in it and wiped the remaining untouched cedar ply. This evened out the problem and when clear polyurethane enhanced the cedar colour, wiped glue could not be detected.

This to some will appear to be too fastidious, but when attempting a perfect finish on a piece of furniture destined to become a family heirloom, this little trick is worth remembering.



Two incidents were reported this month, both involving the Hammer table saw.

A member allowed a length of wood being sawn to lift at the back of the blade to be picked up by the teeth and kicked back at high speed, into the annex near the kiln. Luckily no one else was in the line of fire at the time. This happens from time to time, and again we must remind members using the machine to:

- A. Stand to one side of the cutting line and the piece being cut.
- B. Use two push sticks if necessary, one to advance the piece into the blade, and the second to prevent the piece from being picked up by the rising teeth at the back of the blade and forcefully kicked out.
- C. Ensure that the piece being cut (between the blade and the fence) is moved fully past the blade, to avoid kick back. **DO NOT** allow the piece to sit between the blade and fence while you switch the saw off, as it only has to move fractionally to catch the blade and kick back. Do a Google search on 'table saw kick back' to find a lot of useful information on the subject.
- D. If you are not sure of the technique needed, ask the Shed Captain for the day for advice. The Shed Captain will be pleased to help you because member safety is our number one priority and some incidents occur though failure to understand the forces involved.

The second incident remains a mystery. Traces of blood were found on the same machine at the end of another session. A member had hurt himself or herself either on the machine or perhaps on a sharp timber edge and had left without reporting it. We must stress again that any incident, or the near miss of an incident, must be reported to the Shed Captain so that procedures can be amended to avoid a repeat.

Would all Shed Captains please note that any incident must be reported in the **DAY BOOK** which is placed for convenience on the meeting room table, and also **THE INCIDENT BOOK** which is kept on top of the first aid cabinet.

Maintenance Report By Graham Bradford




Nothing of significance to report this month. The usual items have been serviced or replaced, which of course is an expense to the Club.

Around The Shed


Speaking of sheds, you will all now be aware of the increasingly urgent need for an additional shed as our membership continues to grow. New shed equals money, which is all that is now missing.
