SHED MANAGERS REPORT

A satisfying month from some aspects, and disappointing in others.

Maintenance:

Damage to equipment has again not been too bad this month. Some exceptions have included:

- Woodman Table Saw No 1 had a major issue when someone was removing the riving knife, and omitted to tighten one of the screws. As a consequence, the knife came loose, came in contact with the blade, and damaged both the blade and the knife. Please only remove the riving knife if you have a legitimate reason, and be sure to put it back correctly. This is an expensive fix.
- The older drill press had an issue with the return spring for the spindle. This was able to be adjusted to fix.
- The guard on the Festool compound mitre saw has had a bit broken off. We will
 get a replacement, but in the interim, if you are having trouble lowering the saw,
 don't force it, see one of the Shed Managers.
- The compressor tripped out a couple of times on overload. Upon examination, the issue is air leakage, not a problem with the compressor per se. Thank goodness. We are working to improve that, but in the meantime, you may notice some of the air connections are disconnected. If you need air from those outlets, feel free to connect them, but disconnect them when you are finished.
- Security

Another ordinary period for security. Better than the previous months, but still a couple of occasions of urn and coffee machines being left on. Please check the place over before you leave

Projects

We have a number of projects underway on upgrading BRWG facilities, and the following is a progress update for members.

Kiln Upgrade. This is now just about done, and we have the first load of timber currently drying. We still have to get on top of the control logic, and from the records so far, we have a little more thinking to do on the air baffles. It is drying better though

Millers Shed. Also nearly complete, with only the roller door (s) to go.

The Office. Also nearly complete, bar some eves work and trim painting. Looking very sharp now

Some other ongoing projects are:

Timber Storage Shed and Bigger Woodwiz. The Management Committee have approved this project to progress, but we are also examining the possibility of some Council funding.

Laminated Beams. One of the major events this month was the arrival of a very big load (93 beams) of Laminated timber. These are now in storage at Western Av. This will be a major resource for the Club going forward. If you have a use for some laminated timber, see the Shed Captain.

Power Upgrade. No further progress on this to date.


A BIT OF HISTORY
